## Is Episode VII a hit or a miss?

For the first time in ten years, the Star Wars franchise released another episode, and the massive hype surrounding the release has prompted many first time Star Wars viewers and die-hard fans to the theaters.

It seems as though the culture surrounding Star Wars has attracted a wider audience. In 2012, The Walt Disney Company bought the franchise and announced the creation of the newest Star Wars episode: "The Force Awakens."

Directed by J.J. Abrams, the new movie takes viewers in a more progressive direction by casting a black male lead, John Boyega, as Finn, and a female lead, Daisy Ridley, as Rey.

Senior John Dolan said, "I expected more Disney themes to bleed through, but Disney did a good job sticking to the story line, compared to other series that have been taken over by Disney."

Perhaps it was due to The Walt Disney Company taking over that the targeted audience expanded.

According to junior Paul Miller, "there's a younger audience; I think there was more humor in it so I think it appealed to younger kids too."

Not only has the age group expanded, but the type of person going to see the movie is no longer simply the die-hard Star Wars fan, but others who want to be a part of the fandom.

"My family had always been big Star Wars fans, and I never really got into the old movies, but for the new one I was sort of dragged along for the experience," said Sophomore Ellie Cudmore

It seems as though many

people had seen only parts of the previous movies, and are generally more interested in the new one. Junior Hannah Miller said, she had seen parts of the other movies, and Paul Miller (no relation) said he had seen all the movies at some time or another when he was younger, but he, "re-watched the fifth movie" before seeing The Force Awakens.

Others, like sophomore Alli Salmon, prepared before going to the new movie. "My dad is a big fan so we watched all the movies, and then we went to see the new one and it was nice because we knew who the characters were and everything made sense," she said.

38 years after "Episode IV: A New Hope" blew movie-goers off their feet, the release of "Episode VII: The Force Awakens" signals the reemergence of one of the most iconic movie series' of all time.

Disney bought the rights to the franchise for over \$4 billion in 2012, and "The Force Awakens" kicked off a series of Star Wars movies that will release over the next five years.

This time, the plot revolved around destroying yet another Imperial space station, something all too familiar after the Rebel forces did the same thing in "A New Hope." The latest Star Wars movie reawakened not only the force but the entire series as well. The nostalgic "Force Awakens" brought the integrity and cohesiveness of the original trilogy back to Star Wars after the disappointing prequels.

J.J. Abrams' new movie lived up to massive hype. It created original and comedy-filled characters meeting up with veterans like Han Solo and Chewbacca. Being compared to the originals is exactly what Abrams shot for as the original trilogy was essentially a masterpiece. On Rotten Tomatoes "A New Hope" and "The Empire Strikes Back" received an outstanding 94% approval rating, and "Return of the

Jedi" earned a respectable 80%, but when excitement built up about the release of "The Phantom Menace" in 1999, the movie completely disappointed and Rotten Tomatoes tagged it with a "rotten" 56% approval.

The lack of flow and politically focused plots of the prequels, were nonexistent in "The Force Awakens", bringing promise to the new trilogy.
