Elections begin today for GAA officers for next year. GAA announced its nominations two weeks ago for president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer. Last week petitions also were issued to any girl who wishes to run.

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Fu-No-Yoru is the English translation for the name of the year's junior prom. The name ties in with the central theme of the dance. It was chosen by a planning committee selected from members of the decorations committee. They were assisted by Japanese AFS Exchange Student Akira Shimizu. The English translation will not be revealed until after the dance, but it is revealed at all. The dance is being held June 8.

May 22, there will be an assembly for all members. Awards will be handed out and pool guards announced. That evening, at the annual spring banquet, the 1957-1958 officers and board will be revealed.

Mr. Fred C. Windoes, a member of the NT faculty for 43 years, and head of the science department for 34 years, has announced his June retirement. Succeeding him as science department head will be Mr. Carl Clader.

Mr. Windoes was named head of the science department in 1923 when the job was first created. As head of the summer school for 31 years, until Mr. Robert Harper took over the job, and senior boys' adviser chairman for many years, Mr. Windoes devoted much of his time to NT.

Concerning his future plans, Mr. Windoes said recently that he intends to travel around the United States with his wife.

Mr. Clader will take over the duties of science department head next fall. He has been a teacher at New Trier since 1939, excepting a few years he spent in the United States Air Force during the war.

He holds a Master of Science degree earned at Northwestern university and has done some work toward his Ph.D. As a member of a committee of five chemistry teachers, Mr. Clader composed some of the questions on this year's CEEB chemistry test.
