
# **Student Views**

## Political comedy now 'real news'

In today's tense political climate, a surprising news outlet holds more power than ever before.

Comedians and late night hosts have been having a field day with the current administration, and for good reason. They're just too easy not to make fun of.

With each press conference, appearance, or string of executive orders, there is a new buffet of material to work with.

It's not only the entertainment that these shows provide that make them so crucial to our society, but also the legitimate information they provide.

Despite the fact that she swerved every question, at least Meyers engaged her in an important discussion.

John Oliver, Trevor Noah, and Samantha Bee, use their airtime to discuss one topic and delve into the specifics of the topic along with adding humor.

For example, on "Last Week Tonight" with John Oliver that aired this month the entire show was dedicated to discussing the French elections. Even sources like SNL provide some sense of truth in their weekly skits and short films.

Melissa McCarthy appeared on the show and played the now iconic role of Sean "Spicy" Spicer. The highly dramatized and obviously hilarious scene was clearly comedy gold, and since the first airing McCarthy has returned to SNL to continue the joke.

Her portrayal is important for more than just its comedic value. It's also prompted responses from the White House, which has been adamantly against responding to news outlets.

While "real" news sources are tied up with constantly overcoming political tension, comedians are allowed to "report" the news.

Not many other news outlets have time to devote a half hour to discuss one topic. Although the sole purpose of these shows is comedy, often the stories they report contain more fact than the politically charged news outlets.
