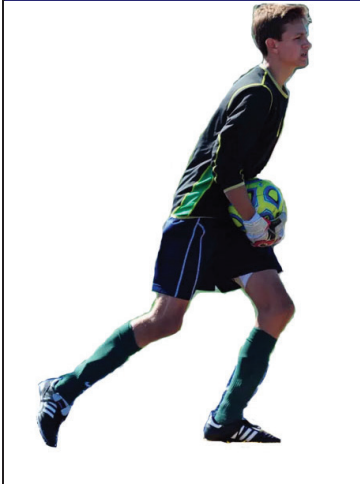


Three Stars of the Week

Trevians win nail-biter over Evanston

They remain perfect heading into the homecoming game

Last Friday, the Trevs beat the Evanston Wildkits 14-12 after junior Francis Fay scored the winning touchdown with three minutes to go and a last minute defensive stand.

In this 106th matchup against Evanston, the Trevians capitalized on the Wildkits' mistakes. The Wildkits' 27-yard loss because of a bad snap on a punt attempt led to Fay's score, where he punched it in from the one yard line. Fay told the Chicago Tribune that he looked up to his brother, Daniel, a 2014 New Trier grad. "He will be the first person I call to talk about the game."

The matchup opened with a 3-0 Evanston lead following Owen Ennis' 31-yard field goal. The score remained unchanged until the opening of the second half when junior quarterback Clay Czyzyski scored from one yard to make the score 7-3. Czyzyski's offense was crucial for the team, with 17 rushes for 77-yards and 9-16 passing for 51-yards.

The fourth quarter began with an early 33-yard Ennis field goal, making the score 7-6. Following Fay's touchdown, Evanston retaliated with a 3-yard touchdown run by senior Tray Banks, to make the score 14-12. Their attempt at a two point conversion, however, fell incomplete. Senior Devin Murphy's pass rush caused it to be off-target, skimming past the fingertips of

Banks in the back of the end zone. Evanston attempted an onside kick which was recovered by senior Joe Lewis, and the game was won. The two teams were never separated by more than eight points throughout the game.

Max Bryla, a junior reserve linebacker, rose to the occasion in the second quarter when inside linebacker Max Rosenthal left with an injury. Bryla managed five tackles, including one for a loss.

Senior outside linebacker Charlie Stimson had 7 tackles, including a 14-yard sack of Evanston

quarterback Matt Little and a 3-yard tackle for a loss.

Czyzyski, Stimson, and Bryla, as well as senior OLB Colin Casas and senior safety Lucas Bartzis received the game balls.

With this victory, the Trevians are 5-0 under Head Coach Brian Doll for a second season. Doll became the coach in 2014.

"I got a ton of e-mails and texts this week about the game," said Doll, according to the Chicago Tribune.

"Our kids are passionate about it, and it was good to be in a tight one with a playoff-like atmosphere."

He later tweeted saying, "Great win for the trevs last night at Evanston. 14-12 and a classic rivalry game. So proud of the team. #5-0 #gotrevs."

The Trevians have proven victorious in the recent E-Town beatdowns, as the last time the Wildkits won was 2010, by a score of 18-15.

Despite this victory, New Trier will have to win more games against the Wildkits to settle the score. Evanston still has an advantage on New Trier, with a 54-47-5 overall record.

Girls tennis aces the start of their 2015 season

With a record of 15-0, varsity is led by strong upperclassmen

Despite having a relatively young team, New Trier Girls Tennis has raced to a 15-0 record to start the year.

The Trevians are featuring plenty of talented underclassman and upperclassmen, with freshman Michelle Capone and sophomore Amia Ross playing number one doubles.

"Both Michelle and Mia are very solid and have been really good for us all year. They've really emerged for us," said Jerry Morse-Karzen, Varsity Head Coach of girls tennis.

In addition to their perfect record, New Trier hasn't lost a dual match all year. The big thing that everyone on the team stressed was their depth.

"The best part about this team is how close everyone is in their level. We have a lot of really good players, so we have a lot of different match ups that are possible," said senior Libby Mohn.

While the younger members are leading the way in doubles, singles has been led by upperclassmen, with senior Cammy Frei playing number one singles.

"She's our best player," Mohn said of Frei. "She's been great for us all year."

"Cammy Frei has definitely been our best player. Not only because she's our number one singles player, but also because of the attitude she

has towards tennis and the team. She always puts in her best effort on the court and sets a great example for all of us to follow. She is an amazing player and everyone looks up to her," said senior Emma Cavalier.

The first big test for the Trevians came when they traveled down to St. Louis to play in the Edwardsville Invite. The Trevians won the event, maintaining their perfect record.

"It was a great trip with a lot of tennis played," said Morse-Karzen. "The whole team (20 kids) got to travel and play in the invite, which rarely happens."

The Trevians split their team in two so that everyone could play. The second team got third in the invite.

Last season, New Trier finished fourth in state, but according to Morse-Karzen, the Trevians have potential to do even better this year.

"It's different this year because we are just so deep. Our four to twelve players are practically interchangeable for us. It becomes difficult for us to play everyone," said Morse-Kalazen.

"I'd say the best part of the team is actually the emphasis on the team factor," said Cavalier. "Tennis is such an individual sport that it's important that we remember the team aspect, and our coaches do a great job of incorporating that in. All the girls are such great girls and always support each other on and off the courts."

Although New Trier is undefeated, according to Mohn, state may not be a given for them.

"Winning state is a realistic possibility because we have a solid lineup, but the problem is other schools like Hinsdale Central and

Stevenson also have strong lineups," said Mohn.

"We have big games coming up against Maine South, Loyola, Stevenson, and Hinsdale Central that should be great tests for us," said Morse-Karzen.

In order to maintain their undefeated streak, the Trevians will have to rely on upperclassmen. Seniors Tess Lubin and Catherine MacKinnon, as well as juniors

Michelle Buyer and Katie Lofdahl will need to continue performing well.

"I think the team doesn't need to improve much, but if I had to pick one it would be consistency. Consistency wins matches and often we focus on point-ending drills and techniques and don't put enough emphasis on the importance of staying consistent," said Cavalier.
