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Boys and girls golf primed for State run

As the regular season nears its conclusion, New Trier golf has high expectations for October.

After finishing second at the IHSA State Tournament last season, the Boys Golf team is looking to build on their past success.

"We've had a very successful season," said head coach Pete Drevline. "Of the 18 events we have had, we've won 16, so I'm very pleased with the overall season."

What makes the Trevians so dangerous is their depth. Led by senior captains Jack Junge, Will Connelly, and Will Seaman, this is a cohesive unit with eight guys who could be number one golfers on any team.

The rest of the team is rounded out by juniors Andrew Huber, Nick Iserloth, Ethan Schmitt, and Matt Murlick, as well as sophomore Justin Choi.

Junge used an interesting, yet telling metaphor, to describe the roster.

"We are deeper than the bottom of the ocean at its deepest point," he said.

Junge, Connelly, and Iserloth, who were three of the Trevs' top four golfers at the State Tournament last season, provide experience for this

deep squad.

"Having experience from last year to draw back on is huge," said Connelly. "About half of our team didn't play in states last year so relaying tips to them is a big advantage."

"We've got the core back from last year," Drevline added. "These guys have been very focused and they have one common goal, to get better each and every week and really working towards playing their best golf in October."

Connelly is confident in his team's chances to improve from their second place finish last year.

"Although most teams have a couple great players, our team, from top to bottom, is capable of playing great golf," he concluded.

The girls golf team wrapped up a similarly dominant season on Oct. 1, clinching the Central Suburban League conference championship at Sunset Valley.

"We went 8-0 in our conference and we won several tournaments. I think we're playing well at the right time of the year," said head coach Scott Fricke.

New Trier is led by junior Louise McCulloch, the individual CSL conference champion, and seniors Lauren Holly, Becca Lindblad, and

"This season, all the practice from the summer and the work we have done as a team has really helped me succeed," said McCulloch.

A fourth place finish at State last season came as a bit of a disappointment after winning state in 2012. Holly, Lindblad, and Suh were

all members of that team two years ago, and they know what it will take to bring another state championship to New Trier.

"Since we've been there before we know we can do it again, especially since we've kept working and improving since 2012 and 2013," said Holly. "We are all really motivated and ready to go."

The experience from last year's run will also be very beneficial. This team has plenty of knowledge of the state championship course, which is played at Hickory Point Golf Club.

"As a team we all really know what to expect and are hopeful we'll make it down again," added McCulloch. "Then we'll just try our best and have fun with it."

Fricke, however, is taking things one step at a time.

"You just have to get to the state tournament," he said. "We're in a very difficult regional and sectional so we have to advance out of those, but once you get to state you have to play well; it's about knowing the course and having confidence in yourself and your teammates."

Holly embodies the calm and confident nature of this team.

"We've practiced hard and we have stayed focused," she concluded. "We have a lot of confidence and we support each other as a team."

Field hockey looks to avenge 2013

The New Trier Field Hockey season is coming to a close and the state championship contending Trevians (17-1-1) are primed for a deep playoff run.

Their only loss this season came against Lake Forest High School (LFHS), as they fell short by a score of 4-3. After trailing for most of the game, New Trier was able to notch an equalizer in the second half to tie the contest at 2-2.

Head Coach Stephanie Nykaza said, "We didn't 'mentally' play well. We went into the game pretty nervous and it would have been a very different game if we were mentally focused and ready."

The tie score at the end of regulation led to the enforcement of a new rule in Field Hockey, in which tie games are settled with one-on-one penalty strokes. Lake Forest scored the first penalty shot, but New Trier answered with a goal of their own. After Lake Forest tallied another penalty shot goal, the Scouts secured a victory by saving the Trevians' next shot.

"We didn't play as well as we would have liked," said senior attacker Rachel Mirkin. "We went into overtime and shootouts with them, and if we played more composed like we usually do, we could have beaten them."

They will play Lake Forest again on the 17th at home at New Trier Stadium.

"Hopefully next time we play them we end up with a 'W," said senior defender Grace Hemmer.

New Trier has continued their trend of close games with tight results against two non-conference opponents. On Sept. 30 they played Lake Forest Academy (LFA) and tied 3-3. They rebounded against North Shore Country Day (NSCD) on Oct. 2, winning 2-1 after scoring the goahead goal in the last five minutes of regulation. In both games, the Trevians were able to recover from early deficits.

"It's hard to come back in a

field hockey game," said Nykaza. "[Field hockey] is a very low-scoring game, and once you fall behind it's hard to recover. In both the LFA and NSCD games we fell behind and it was very lucky that we were able to catch up."

Hemmer said, "In the game against North Shore [Country Day], they scored early in the first half off of a lucky shot and we spent the rest of the game trying to catch up. In the last five minutes we had two awesome goals from Lindsay Hackett and Kitty Kenyon and we ended up walking away with a win."

Their successful regular season so far has come on the heels of a stout defense. New Trier hasn't allowed a goal in 12 of 17 games.

"The season has been going pretty well so far. We work well as a team and we have a lot of talented players," said Mirkin.

With a combination of reliable defense and offensive talent, expectations are high for the playoffs. Postseason play begins on Oct. 20 and the Trevians hope to be seeded first for the tournament.

"I hope that we face [LFHS] in state, but so many games have been so close. Almost anything can happen in the postseason," said Hemmer.

Hemmer and the Trevians will be looking for a different result from last year's state championship, when the Scouts blanked New Trier 3-0.

With a team full of seniors, they have the experience to do so.

"The state championship game will be at New Trier this year, but to get there we have to win more big games," said Nykaza. "I would like to make it to the 'final four,' and I think that we can get there."
